





Wellness includes both mental and physical well-being through several processes – diet, nutrition, preventive medicine, traditional medicine, dietary supplements, hot springs and others. Here are 5 wellness resorts in Thailand where travellers can enhance their wellness quotient.



Kamalaya, Koh Samui

Located amid a tropical landscape on the southern coastline of Koh Samui, Kamalaya is a Wellness Sanctuary and Holistic Spa Resort. It has an array of wellness programmes offering holistic therapies from Eastern and Western traditions. 
Atsumi Healing, Phuket


Amatara Wellness Resort, Cape Panwa

The Rice Terraces of the Philippine Cordilleras

A Living Cultural Landscape

Since time aeon, various folds of Nature – lakes, mountains, forests, national parks, beaches, backwaters and others – have drawn tourists into its immensity across the world. However, witnessing the rice terraces and the human culture and activities that has sustained them since thousand years is an experience of its own.



The Emerald Rice Terraces of the Philippine Cordilleras

Considered as the 'Eighth Wonder of the World', The Rice Terraces of the Philippine Cordilleras were carved into the Cordillera mountain range on the northern island of Luzon, Philippines archipelago, in the Ifugao province, by the indigenous people. As per anthropologist Otley Beyer, the terraces are over 2,000 years old. Located at 4,900 ft above the sea level, the characteristic 'steps', which require constant and meticulous reconstruction, have been built largely by hand – with minimal use of equipment.

Traced back to two millennia in the pre-colonial Philippines, 5 Rice Terraces of the Philippine Cordilleras have been inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List in 1995. The historic terraces cover an extensive area; however, the inscribed property consists of five clusters across four municipalities.

These Rice Terraces are living cultural landscape – which means a modification of the natural landscape by human activities. UNESCO takes note of the blending of the physical, economic, religious, socio-cultural and political environment that won these five Rice Terraces a place in its prestigious list.

The five clusters include the Nagacadan terrace cluster in the Kiangan municipality; the Hungduan terrace; the central Mayoyao terrace cluster; the Bangaan terrace cluster and the Batad terrace cluster in the Banaue municipality.

Batad and Bangaan are under the jurisdiction of the Municipality of Banaue but they are different from the Banaue Rice Terraces.



The Ifugao Rice Terraces have also been inscribed in the List of World Heritage in Danger in 2001 as deforestation, climate change and lack of interest by the younger generation of Ifugao threaten to destroy the terraces.



The Art behind the World Heritage Rice Terraces

The Rice Terraces are the only other form of surviving stone construction from the pre-colonial period. Difficult terrain helped Cordillera tribes to ward off foreign invasion and preserve their tradition. These terraces source water through ancient irrigation system from the rainforests that lie above the terraces. It is believed that if put end to end the terraces would encircle almost half of the globe. The stone or mud walls along with the rigorous carving of the natural folds of the Cordillera mountains resulted in emerald terraced pond fields. It reflects the cooperative approach of the whole community that weaves extensive knowledge of - lunar cycles, zoning and planning, soil conservation, complex pest control and the rich diversity of biological resources existing in the Ifugao agro-ecosystem. The builders of these terraces developed intricate irrigation systems; elaborate farming system; and harvested water from the forests of the mountain tops.



humanity with a series of Rice Terraces, that continue to live from over thousand years. The muyong system refers to the unique system of tending forests by Ifugao inhabitants. It is internationally recognised as an ideal forest management strategy. Each terrace cluster is capped by muyong, a private forest. They are home to about 264 indigenous plant species, mostly endemic to the region. Part of the whole mountain ecology, these terraces form unique clusters of micro-watersheds. They are inundated with irrigation water all year long. They serve as the rainwater filtration system. A biorhythm technology that combines the rhythm of climate and hydrology management has made it possible for farmers to grow rice over large stretches.

The Tapestry of UNESCO inscribed Rice Terraces

Hungduan Rice Terraces is the oldest rice terrace cluster of the World Heritage-listed Rice Terraces of the Philippine Cordilleras. Since the terrace formation resembles a spider web, this cluster is also known as spider web terraces. Located on the northern part of Kiangan, The Nagacadan Rice Terraces are formed as two distinct ascending rows of terraces bisected by a river. Nagacadan is approximately 20 minutes ride from the municipal hall. The stonewalled Mayoyao Rice Terraces are punctuated with traditional pyramid-shaped farmers' houses (bale) and granaries (alang). The deep green Bangaan Rice Terraces have an Ifugao traditional village studded in one corner. Batad Rice Terraces are in the form of amphitheatre-like semi-circular terraces with a village at its base. Visitors can reach Banaue and Ifugao by bus from Manila.

The Rice Terraces of The Philippine Cordilleras are an enduring example of sustainable and harmonising relationship between humans and nature. Human perseverance and natural eco-system have painted an unsurpassable beauty. Sculpted on the mountains, carved on the UNESCO list, printed on the timeline of history over 2000 years, The Rice Terraces of the Philippine Cordilleras should be etched in the bucket list of the travellers.



Destination Diary

JOHOR BAHRU

A shining diadem of Malaysia



Johor Bahru, one of the most fascinating states of Malaysia, is the southern gateway to the country named after the Arabic word “Jauhar” or jewels. It was called “Gangganu” by the Siam traders, which also means gems.

The city was formerly known as Tanjung Puteru and is currently a part of Iskandar Malaysia which is the country's second largest metropolitan area.

Johor Bahru is connected to the Lion City of Singapore and is a prime commercial hub. Many Singaporeans visit the city for its affordable shopping sites and expats from Kuala Lumpur are also relocating. Jalan Wong Ah Fook is the main boulevard of the city's central business district.

Captivating culture

Johor Bahru has mystical history and diverse culture. It is full of ecological treasures and gastronomical delights where adventure seekers or leisure lovers can find everything.

The city has recorded the highest growth in Southeast Asia and is a part of the Sijori Growth Triangle. Istana Besar or The Grand Palace is one of the historical attractions within which The Royal Abu Bakar Museum is located.

Johar's culture is mostly influenced by the Arabian traditions and the Javanese. The musical instruments used in *Zapin* (a Malay dance form) has similarity with the Arabs' Hadramaut and the *Kuda Kepand* (that uses horse-shaped plaited mats as props) originating from Java. The performances involve a witch doctor and the dance is mystical as the dancers are known to be possessed by the spirit of the horses.





Sights and attractions around

There are famous landmarks and attractions in the city that include ***Bangunan Sultan Ibrahim, Istana Besar, Sultan Iskandar Complex, Istana Bukit Serene and Istana Pasir Pelangi.***

Located along the Jalan Skudai is the Sultan Abu Bakar State Mosque, the state mosque of Johar constructed between 1892 and 1900. For kids, Johar has the Sanrio Hello Kitty Town which has a Hello Kitty amusement park with a playground, craft activities and entertainment. The Arulmigy Sri Rajakaliamman Glass Temple is the first and only glass temple in the nation listed in the Malaysian book of Records.

Hutan Bandar or Jungle in the city is ideal for kids as it has a nice garden with children's playground and public pool.

The Jalan Segget is a daily bazaar here to buy clothes, shoes, bags and accessories. There are five national parks and Pulau Kukup is an uninhabited island in the south-west region of Johar. It is placed at a distance of about 1 km offshore from the 150-year old fishing village of Kukup in Pontian. It houses 50% of the world true mangrove species, 12 species of fauna and 76 species of birds.


Johar is a perfect sandy getaway; its west coast fronts the Straits of Malacca and the east coast is close to beautiful beaches and island. Through Mersing Jetty or Tanjung Leman jetty, the islands remain accessible.

Johar is the first city in Malaysia to practice a low-carbon economy and it hosts important congresses, conferences and trade fairs like the Eastern Regional Organisation for Planning and Housing and the World Islamic Economic Forum.

How to reach?

Located in the northwest of the city is Senai International Airport which is just a 30-minute taxi ride from the city centre. Many international and national flights are connected from here. Car rental is another good option. There are many special pick up locations throughout the country to reach Johar Bahru. The Kuala Lumpur International Airport has a pick up point and Kuala Lumpur is just about 4.5 hours drive to Johar Bahru.

Many buses ply from the main bus terminal, Puduraya in Kuala Lumpur to Johar Bahru. One can also take train from Kuala Lumpur Sentral Station.



Indulge in

During your stay, learn Kuda Kepan, a traditional dance performance or relish the unique Johar delicacies like the Kacang Pongol and Mee Bandung. Explore the diversity in the vast protected nature preserve of Endau Rompin which is the peninsula's largest virgin lowland forests.


The state also has finely laid out golf courses and there are plenty of theme parks, shopping malls and indoor sports arena. Visit the Gunung Ledang, a legendary mountain with its own tales and history. Laksa Johor is a unique traditional food. It uses spaghetti instead of the typical rice noodles. Among the must-try here are Mi bandung, Briyani Gam and Roti Kirai.




Pentaport Rock Festival



Sri Lanka's most popular festival, Esala Perahera attracts millions of tourists every year for the performances of the glitzy dancers dressed decadently, the constant thumping of drums and elephants decked in their finest clothes. According to mythology, one of the Buddha's teeth was stolen from his grave 1700 years ago and believed to have been smuggled into Sri Lanka.

Putrajaya expects to attract 30 million visitors for the year 2020

Putrajaya wants to welcome 30 million visitors for the year 2020. Malaysia's most popular city Putrajaya tried to host a concert for a world-class performing artist. The people who are protesting are just the minority. In 2018, Malaysia attracted 25.8 million tourist arrivals with a tourism revenue of RM84.1 billion (S\$27.84 billion). Malaysia is also ranked 21 in the United Nations World Tourism Organisation 2019 Barometer Report. In 2017, the tourism industry contributed 14.9 per cent to the national economy compared to 10.4 per cent in 2005. The number of people employed in the tourism industry also increased to 3.4 million in 2017 from 1.5 million in 2005, making up 23.2 per cent of the total labour force.

Sheremetyevo International Airport sees 14.1 per cent year on year increase

Sheremetyevo International Airport is experiencing a huge arrival of passengers during the first half of 2019. Around 23,404 million passengers flew during the

first six months of 2019 showing a 14.1 per cent year on year increase. The airport provided 188,346 take-off and landing operations showing a 14.6 per

cent increase year on year in HY1 2019. Due to the increased demand for flights to Antalya, Beijing, Bangkok and Rome there is a growth in passenger traffic.



Formula 1 Australian Grand Prix expects to attract 80 million international tourists

Melbourne will host the Formula 1 Australian Grand Prix after F1 executives moved to lock in a two-year option on the iconic Albert Park circuit. The Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events Martin Pakula revealed that Melbourne spectacular would remain a pillar of the Victorian sports calendar until at least its 30th running. The new deal was confirmed by Formula 1 chairman and chief executive Chase Carey in Europe overnight. The Formula 1 Australian Grand Prix takes Melbourne to the world with international tourists flocking to the city and images beamed to an estimated global audience of 80 million, including key markets China, India and Japan.



Travel & Tourism Fair (TTF), the oldest and the biggest travel trade show network in India concluded its 30th edition of TTF Kolkata with a record turnout of more than 10,000 visitors.

TTF Kolkata was held from July 12-14 in the Netaji Indoor Stadium and Khudiram Anushilan Kendra with 440 exhibitors from 14 countries and 25 Indian states, including pavilions of various national and state tourism boards.

Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and Nepal participated as Partner Countries while Thailand and Bahrain joined as the Feature Countries. Exhibitors from Bhutan, China, Malaysia, Nepal, Singapore, South Africa and UAE have also taken part in the show.

Among the Indian states, West Bengal and Uttarakhand had the largest pavilions, followed by Odisha, Gujarat, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan who had set up extensive state pavilions with their private operators. Tamil Nadu, Himachal Pradesh, Assam, Jharkhand, Lakshadweep, Tripura, Nagaland, Jammu & Kashmir and Karnataka had also erected state pavilions, to attract tourists to their states.

India Tourism actively supported and was prominently present at the show.

TTF Forum, the knowledge-sharing platform conducted a panel discussion in Kolkata on “How Bangladeshi Tourists Outnumbered European Travellers to India and Indian tourists to Bangladesh did too”. The panel speakers included Taufiq Rahman, Chief Executive of Journey Plus, Syed Shaffat Uddin Ahmed, Managing Director of Market n-Trance Ltd. and Mohiuddin Helal, the CEO of River and Green Tours.

Over the years, apart from serving the tourists with information and booking facilitation, TTF has been a vital networking opportunity for the travel trade from the region, along with their counterparts from all over India.
